"The 'Book Bundle' model is your easiest recurring revenue. Collect donated or thrift-store books (usually free or \$0.25-0.50 each), sort them into themed bundles of 3-5 books — 'Rainy Day Adventure Pack,' 'Bedtime Story Collection,' 'Science Explorer Set' — wrap them with twine and a cute label, and sell them for \$5-10 per bundle. Parents love these as gifts, teachers buy them for classroom libraries, and kids love the surprise element of a curated pack. One afternoon of sorting and bundling can produce 15-20 bundles worth \$75-200 in sales."

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Parents: Building mini library boxes involves basic woodworking (sawing, nailing, painting) which requires parental supervision for all ages. Pre-made library box kits are available if you prefer to avoid power tools entirely. For book swap events and reading challenges, parents should help coordinate with venues, schools, and sponsors. Book sourcing from thrift stores and garage sales is a great parent-child activity. This business promotes literacy, community engagement, and organizational skills — and looks outstanding on future college applications and scholarship essays.
